
Sadly, America's WETLAND is vanishing at a rate of 25 square miles a year! My friends and I hope this booklet will help you learn more about America's WETLAND.

Captain Eddy and the Estuarians




DID YOU KNOW:

"Respect our habitat."



Use your favorite estuary characters. I've started you out by including me in the first box! Now, you add other characters and backgrounds, and fill in the talk bubbles.






Hi! My name is **Rocky** the raccoon, and I live near Mossy. Have you heard about America's WETLAND vanishing? Well, I know it's true because I live there.

view the map, there are two questions for you to answer. Once you know the facts, you can teach other people about coastal Louisiana and its land loss.






